# 2018-19 SSEP Report

### Smart Waikato's Secondary School Employer Partnerships (SSEP)

2018 was the third year of Smart Waikato's Secondary School Employer Partnerships (SSEP).

SSEP sees employers from a range of sectors interconnecting with school faculties to contextualise learning for Year 9 and 10 students and introduces them to a wide range of careers.

#### 2018 Participants

In 2018 22 Waikato secondary schools, 110 teachers, 140 employers and 2300 students participated in SSEP. 46 % of student participants identified as being Māori.


704 students from 18 participating schools responded to the SSEP student survey. 50.4% of respondents were female and 49.6% percent male. Ethnic breakdown was NZ European/Pākeha (57.2%), Māori (18.3%), Asian (7.7%), Pasifika (3.4%), European (3.4%), Other (10%).

#### Impact on students

Supporting previous years' data the 2018 student survey showed SSEP is continuing to have a "positive and profound" effect on secondary school students throughout Waikato.

When separating out Māori student data we found the impact of SSEP was even more pronounced on this group.

#### Impact on teachers

Many schools are changing the way they deliver curriculum toward cross-curricular or project-based learning. SSEP schools such as Huntly College, Waikato Diocesan and Hillcrest High School have started engaging with their employer partners to co-design learning modules.

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#### Impact on schools

Schools are describing SSEP as creating "transformational change" in the way they are approaching learning.

"From a board perspective we're all very much in favour of SSEP. The students are coming back enthusiastic about learning because they can see its relevance. SSEP also fits in with the school's strategy of getting our kids ready for life outside the school gate. This is more how we would like to see things from an educational perspective." ### 2018-19 SSEP Report

#### **National Award**

In October 2018 Smart Waikato Trust won the Economic Development New Zealand (EDNZ) award for Best Practice in Collaboration with Business, Iwi and Community for Secondary School Employer Partnerships (SSEP).



#### **SSEP 2019**

In 2019 an additional 7 schools will be onboarded into the programme.

Informed by two design thinking sessions held with over 30 educators and employers, Smart Waikato is developing an SSEP Resource Centre to support programme sustainability and build capability within partnerships.

The digital SSEP Resource Centre will be available online housing templates, examples, 'how to' guides and resources. Smart Waikato will also provide an SSEP 'helpdesk' service and continue to monitor and evaluate the programme.
