



Topic 2 Overview Skills, strengths and interests

Purpose

This topic is designed to help students identify their skills, interests, and abilities as a starting point to help guide future career decision-making.

Learning Outcomes

Students will:

- Understand that knowing themselves, their skills, interests, and abilities is the first step in thinking about what career paths might suit them.
- Understand how they can develop their skills and abilities through school subjects and extra-curricular activities and build an employability skills record with endorseMe[®].
- Use Career Central to record their progress.

Activities

- 1. What am I good at?
- 2. What interests me?
- 3. What skills do I have?
- 4. Developing interests and skills outside of the classroom





Activity 1 What am I good at?

Learning Outcomes

Students will:

- understand everyone has different strengths
- identify some of their own strengths and understand how these could be applied in different careers

Suggested Time Allocation

20-40 minutes

Advance Preparation

- Print <u>'What makes me 'Me'</u> worksheet (if using)
- Print 'Which qualities would be useful for which jobs?' (if using)

Resources

- Introducing the topic 'Skills, strengths and interests' video <u>https://youtu.be/zg5dyU-Vy28</u>
- Resource 7: What makes me 'Me' worksheet
- Resource 8: Which qualities would be useful for which jobs? worksheet

1 (Recommended) Check for prior knowledge by starting with a brainstorm activity. Pose the question: What is a skill? How many skills can you think of? What is the difference between skills and natural ability? This could be completed as a full class, in groups or online using a <u>word cloud</u>. (5 minutes)

- 2 (Required) Watch: 'Skills, strengths and interests' video. (3 minutes)
- 3 (Optional) Resource 7: Individually <u>and</u> in pairs complete the <u>'What makes me 'Me'</u> <u>worksheet</u> (15 minutes)
- 4 (Optional) Resource 8: Complete individually <u>or</u> in pairs: <u>Which qualities would be</u> <u>useful for which jobs?</u> (15 minutes)





Activity 2 What interests me?

Learning Outcomes

Students will:

• understand that knowing themselves, their skills, interests and abilities is the first step in exploring which careers and pathways might suit them

Suggested Time Allocation

20-30 minutes

Advance Preparation

- Print off the Rangatahi Futures Career Profiles posters to stick up around the classroom (if using)
- Purchase a block of chocolate (optional)

Resources

- Rangatahi Futures Career Profiles posters (https://www.careers.govt.nz/assets/pages/Rangatahi-Futures/10-English/RF-Year-10-Career-profiles.pdf)
- Optional block of chocolate
- (Required) Watch <u>Rangatahi Futures Career Profiles video</u> to set up the activity.
 (3.5 minutes)
- 2 (Optional) <u>Resource 9: Class brainstorm</u> Following on from the video, how many jobs can you think of that have led to someone buying a block of chocolate?
- 3 (Optional) Group exercise. Stick <u>Rangatahi Futures Career Profiles Posters</u> on walls around the classroom. Get students to read the profiles and stand under the profile that best describes them. As a profile group, students brainstorm as many jobs as they can think of under that profile and share with the class. See <u>Resource 9</u> for ideas. (25 minutes)





Activity 3

What skills do I have?

Learning Outcomes

Students will:

- understand the difference between skills that can be learnt and natural ability (talent)
- learn about employability skills and how they can develop these during their time at school

Suggested Time Allocation

20-30 minutes

Advance Preparation

- Download the <u>'Employability Skills Presentation'</u> slides
- Print 'How many boxes do you tick' worksheet <u>https://smartnz.nz/wp-content/uploads/2022/04/endorseMe-Self-Assessment.pdf</u>

Resources

- Resource 10: Employability skills Powerpoint presentation and student worksheet
- 1 (Optional) Check for prior knowledge by starting with a brainstorm activity. Pose the questions: What is a skill? What is the difference between skills and natural ability? This could be completed as a full class, or in groups. (5 minutes)
- 2 (Optional) Watch the '<u>Understanding Talent</u>' video (2 minutes), and follow up with a class discussion: While the focus of this video was on sport, how might these key points also apply to careers? (5 minutes)
- 3 (Required) Deliver <u>Employability Skills Presentation</u> including the student exercise '<u>How many boxes do you tick</u>' See <u>Resource 10 Employability Skills</u> (15 minutes)





Activity 4

Developing interests and skills outside of the classroom

Learning Outcomes

Students will:

- identify ways they can develop their interests and skills through extra-curricular activities.
- know how to use Career Central to record their progress and support career decision making during their time at high school.

Suggested Time Allocation

20-30 minutes

Advance Preparation

- Download the <u>Career Central presentation slides</u>
- Students will all need a device connected to the internet

- 1 (Recommended) Discussion about discovering new interests and developing skills. Pose the questions: Thinking about your school subjects...
 - What new interests have you discovered so far this year?
 - What kinds of skills are you developing through your school subjects that you think might be useful to you later in your career?
 - Outside of school, how could you discover new interests?
 - What kinds of skills can you develop through extra-curricular activities (remind students about employability skills)?

This could be completed as a full class, or in groups. (10 minutes)

- 2 (Required) Deliver '<u>Getting started with Career Central' Presentation</u> and talk students through logging in to Career Central. (5 minutes) Note students will each need a device connected the internet. The last slide has a video link to a YouTube clip so the teacher will also require internet connection.
- 3 (Required) <u>Resource 11: Developing interests and skills outside of the classroom</u> Career Central activity. (15 minutes)
