## Stay on track:

### What do you need to have in place before you leave school?

The 'Stay on Track' list on the following pages has been designed to help set you up for success as you transition from school to your next career step.

While many students leave school without having all these things ticked off, the more you can do now, the easier you will find the transition.

Some items on the list will take you 2 minutes to sort out (e.g. creating a sensible email address), while others will take some time, planning, money and help from others (e.g. gaining a driver license).

When it feels like you have an overwhelming amount to do or a big goal to reach, it helps to chunk it down into small pieces and gradually tick things off.

This way you are:

- a) setting yourself up for success
- b) not missing out on potential opportunities
- c) won't be left with a big, scary amount to do at the last minute.

To help you break down the list to tackle a bit at a time, we have divided the items up into Year levels to help keep you on track. Note, this is just a guide. You can work on the list in any order and at your own pace.

Use the workbook to make notes as you go and record your progress in Career Central ('Am I on track?', under 'Next Steps').
